

Why Nepean's festival season needs pest awareness

Nepean is one of Ottawa's busiest community hubs for warm-weather fairs, community markets, heritage celebrations, and seasonal park events. Because Nepean is part of the City of Ottawa, local organizers and property owners share broad municipal expectations around waste handling, public health, and property maintenance. That matters during **seasonal events**, when food vendors, temporary seating, and high foot traffic can lead to rapid pest activity.
