The Mechanics Behind the Scenes: Provably Fair Gaming

To fight skepticism and develop trust among users, respectable CSGO gambling sites execute a system called **Provably Fair**.

This cryptographic technology allows gamers to independently verify that the outcome of every video game is genuinely random and has not been manipulated by the house.

- **How it works:** Before a round begins, the server generates a secret "server seed" and hashes it, revealing the hash to the player. The player's internet browser generates a "customer seed." When integrated with a nonce (a counter), these 3 elements figure out the video game outcome.
- **Confirmation:** After the round concludes, the unhashed server seed is exposed. Gamers can plug these variables into a confirmation tool to prove the house didn't alter the outcome midway through.
