

What are pantry pests and how do they enter Brampton homes?

Pantry pests are **stored product pests** that eat dry goods kept in cupboards, cupboards, drawers, and utility spaces. In Brampton homes, they often come in through **food packaging** that already contains eggs or larvae, or they enter through small **entry points** around windows, vents, baseboards, and utility lines. Warm indoor temperatures, especially during Ontario's heating season, can speed up development and make the problem appear to "suddenly" get worse.

Which stored-product pests are most common in Ontario kitchens?

The most typical pantry pests in Ontario kitchens include **Indian meal moths**, **flour beetles**, **weevils**, and **grain beetles**. Each pest behaves a little differently, but all of them target stored foods and can cause ruined food and ongoing cleaning if not dealt with properly.

Indian meal moths are some of the easiest to spot because the adults are small moths that may fly around the kitchen or rest on walls and ceilings. Their larvae often eat in cereal, flour, nuts, dried fruit, and pet food. Webbing is a common clue when the infestation is more advanced.

Flour beetles are tiny, reddish-brown beetles that spread through baking supplies and dry mixes. **Weevils** are often found in grains and rice, and they may appear as small beetles with a distinct snout. **Grain beetles** are also drawn to pantry staples and can move fast between boxes and bags stored nearby. These pests are annoying because they can be hidden inside **infested dry goods** before you ever see the insect itself.

It also helps to freeze items you want to save, especially dry goods that may have been exposed but not heavily infested. **Freeze dry goods** for several days when appropriate, following food safety guidance for the item. This can help interrupt the pest lifecycle if you catch the problem early.
