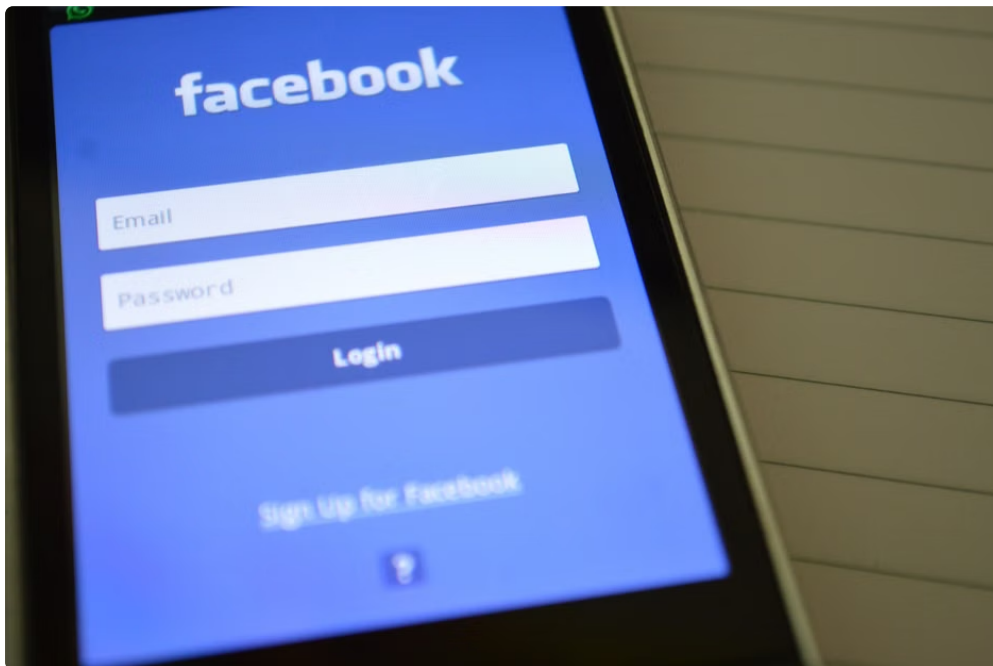
- **Unclear purpose:** If an app requests location, contacts, SMS, or microphone access all at once, it raises suspicion.
