Human Psychology and Behavioral Patterns

When human beings play RPS, they depend on subconscious cognitive biases. Studying these tendencies forms the foundation of winning at RPS gaming.



1. The "Win-Stay, Lose-Shift" Heuristic

Behavioral studies have actually shown that human players show predictable patterns after a round concludes:

- **If a gamer wins:** They tend to stick with the exact same relocation in the next round.
