

How Oswego Fits into the Syracuse Region

Oswego, NY is located on the south shore of **Lake Ontario** in **Oswego County**, making it a true lakefront city in **Central New York**. 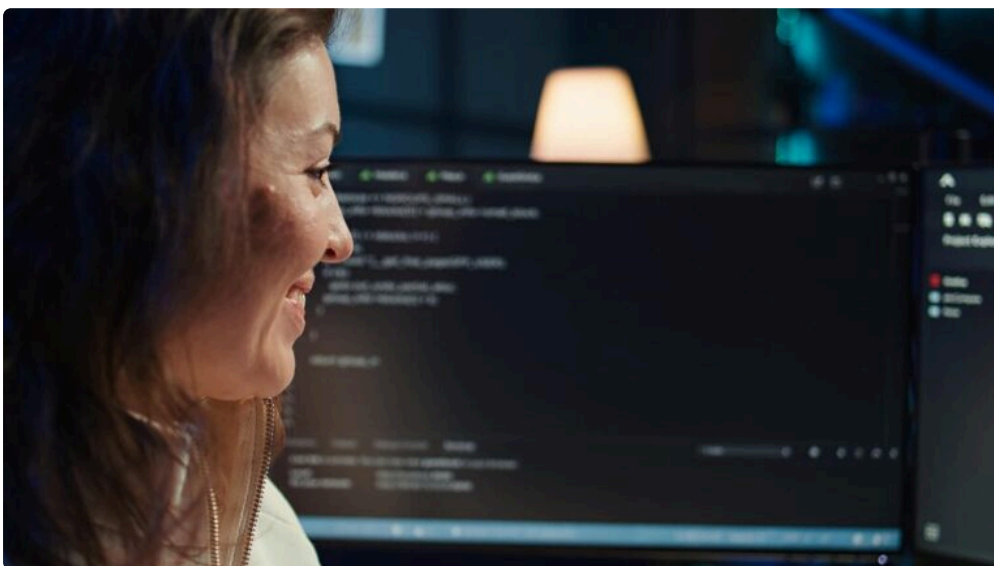
