Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Substantial wear, paint heavily faded or broke.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Severely damaged, often completely altering the look of the weapon.

Note: Some skins are "capped," indicating they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower-float versions exceedingly uncommon and costly.

Rarity Tiers and Finishes

Skins are categorized into various rarity tiers, which determine their drop rates in cases and overall eminence.

- **Consumer Grade (White):** Common, basic drops.
- **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly less typical low-tier products.

- **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard weapon finishes found in most cases.
- **Restricted (Purple):** Higher-tier weapons, often utilized in trade-ups.
- **Categorized (Pink):** Rare, extremely comprehensive designs.
- **Covert (Red):** The most distinguished basic weapon finishes in the video game.
