## 2. The Low Multiplier Strategy (Auto-Cashout)

- **How it works:** Players set an automatic cashout at an extremely low multiplier, generally in between 1.01 x and 1.10 x.
- **Risk Level:** Low per round, but vulnerable to sudden 1.00 x crashes ("immediate busts") that erase collected revenues in a single round.

## 3. The Reverse Martingale (Paroli)

- **How it works:** Players double their bets after a *win* instead of a loss, riding hot streaks while keeping losses minimal during cold streaks.
- **Danger Level:** Moderate. Needs discipline to walk away after a few consecutive wins.
