

The short answer is: occasionally, but not always. Whether to soak horse feed depends on the type of feed, the horse's age, dental issues, hydration requirements, and overall ration. For some horses, soaking can improve taste appeal and digestibility. For others, it takes extra time, can lower feed safety if handled poorly, and may not provide any benefit at all.

- The horse is a picky eater and needs better palatability.
- The feeding plan is designed around a particular veterinary recommendation.

Soaking is of limited benefit when the horse is healthy, has no chewing problems, and already eats the feed comfortably. In those cases, dry feeding is easier and often perfectly appropriate.

Benefits and Risks of Soaking Horse Feed

The key benefits of soaking horse feed are better hydration, less effort to chew, and in some cases better digestibility. Wet feed can be helpful for horses that eat feed quickly, have dental problems, or need a more tender ration. It can also boost acceptance when the feed would otherwise be left in the bucket.
