1. Keep and use them in-game.
2. Sell them on the Steam Community Market for Steam Wallet funds.
3. Trade them directly with other gamers through Steam trades.
4. Gamble or sell them on third-party market sites (though players ought to constantly exercise care with external websites).

## Popular Skin Themes

Throughout the years, specific skin collections have actually dominated the neighborhood's choices. Gamers typically buy matching sets to offer their base and equipment an unified look. A few of the most popular themes include:

- **Glowing (Glow-in-the-Dark):** Highly demanded because they allow players to see their weapons and hotbars in dark environments or throughout the Rust night cycle.
