Delivery versus in-store pickup: it's not just preference, it's logistics

In-store pickup helps when you want control. the smoother it goes. If you show up late to a pickup, you lose time. If you're not ready at delivery time, you lose more than time, you can lose the order.

When in-store pickup is the smarter move

How to make delivery feel less uncertain
