Wear Ratings and Float Values

1. **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Minimal to no wear)

3. **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.37 (Noticeable wear and tear)
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.37-- 0.44 (Significant wear on paint and edges)
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.44-- 1.00 (Heavily damaged, sometimes changing the skin totally)

The Economy: Supply, Demand, and Discontinuation

- **Active Drop Pool:** Cases currently dropping to gamers actively playing the game.
