- **The Arms Deal Collection (2013):** Where it all began. Including the iconic AWP|Asiimov and the original set of knife surfaces, these early cases are now considered uncommon collector's items.

- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Heavy damage, sometimes exposing totally various textures)
