StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

- **StatTrak™**: Items with this technology include an orange LED counter that tracks the number of validated eliminates made with that particular weapon.
- **Souvenir Packages**: These are dropped throughout main Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors) and function gold stickers representing the groups and MVP of the round.

The Rarity Tiers

Valve arranges CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which determine how regularly they drop in-game or emerge from weapon cases.

1. **Consumer Grade (White):** Common, basic drops.
2. **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly better than Consumer, common in containers.
3. **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard lower-tier case drops.
4. **Restricted (Purple):** Often forms the base ingredients for trade-ups.
5. **Categorized (Pink):** Highly detailed, desirable mid-tier skins.
6. **Covert (Red):** The highest basic rarity found in cases, featuring the most intricate styles.
7. **Exotic/ Special (Gold):** Knives and Gloves-- the crown gems of any CS2 stock.
