

Iota sits in that part of southwestern Louisiana where the land feels open, the roads run straight, and the weather has a way of reminding you who is really in charge. On a map, it looks like a quiet dot in Acadia Parish. On the ground, it carries the kind of practical rhythm that shapes daily decisions, from what time to leave for work to how soon to patch a lifted shingle after a storm rolls through.
