How to Fix a Drafty Window

Drafts are the main perpetrator behind high energy costs. Fixing them is frequently straightforward and low-cost.

Step-by-Step Draft Mitigation:

- 1. Locate the Leak:** On a windy day, slowly move a lit incense stay the window frame. Where the smoke flickers or blows sideways, there is a leakage.
- 2. Apply Weatherstripping:** For movable sashes, using V-strip or foam weatherstripping along the jambs seals the spaces when the window is closed.

3. **Caulk the Frame:** For gaps in between the stationary window frame and the outside or interior wall, apply a bead of exterior-grade silicone or paintable latex caulk.
4. **Change Glazing Putty:** On older wood windows, the putty holding the glass in location may have broken and fallen out. Scrape away the old putty and use a fresh layer of window glazier's putty.

How to Fix a Stuck or Jammed Window

A stuck window can be a significant security risk in the occasion of a fire. Depending upon the window product (wood, vinyl, or aluminum), the repair varies.

For Wooden Windows:

- **The Culprit:** Usually layers of old paint imitating glue.
- **The Fix:** Run an utility knife carefully along the joint where the sash satisfies the frame to break the paint bond. If the wood has swollen due to humidity, wait on drier weather condition, then carefully tap a wood block versus the sash with a hammer to loosen it. Sand down any high areas and use paste wax to the tracks.

For Sliding and Vinyl Windows:

- **The Culprit:** Dirt, grit, or a misaligned track.
- **The Fix:** Vacuum the tracks thoroughly. Scrub away stubborn gunk utilizing a toothbrush dipped in a mixture of warm water and moderate meal soap. When dry, spray the tracks with a silicone-based lubricant. Avoid using petroleum-based lubricants (like WD-40) on vinyl, as they can break down the material and bring in more dirt.

How to Replace a Broken Single-Pane Glass Window

Changing a single pane of glass is a timeless DIY task that requires patience and safety gear.

Products Needed:

- Heavy-duty work gloves and safety glasses
- Glass cutter and straightedge
- Putty knife
- Glazier's points
- Window putty (glazing substance)

- Primer and paint

The Process:

1. **Safety First:** Put on gloves and safety glasses. Tape an "X" throughout the broken pane with duct tape to hold fragments together.
2. **Eliminate Broken Glass:** Carefully take out the staying glass fragments from the frame. Use pliers for stubborn pieces.
3. **Clear Old Putty and Points:** Scrape away the old, solidified putty and get rid of the small metal glazier's points utilizing a chisel or pliers. Wire-brush the rabbet (the recessed area holding the glass) until clean, then apply a coat of linseed oil or primer to avoid the wood from drawing moisture out of the brand-new putty.
4. **Bed the Glass:** Roll a thin rope of window putty and press it into the rabbet. Press the brand-new, custom-cut glass pane securely into the putty bed.
5. **Protect and Seal:** Press glazier's points into the wood frame every 6 to 8 inches to hold the glass in location. Use a triangular bead of putty around the exterior perimeter of the glass, smoothing it at an angle with a putty knife. Allow it to treat before painting.

Preventive Maintenance Tips

- **Tidy Tracks Regularly:** Keep dust, leaves, and dead bugs out of window tracks every spring and fall.
- **Examine Seals and Caulking:** Check exterior caulking yearly. Reapply caulk before winter season sets in to prevent water seepage and freezing damage.
- **Oil Moving Parts:** Apply a light silicone spray to hinges, locks, and tracks as soon as a year to guarantee smooth operation.
- **Wash Glass and Frames:** Dirt buildup can degrade window surfaces and seals in time. An easy wash with soapy water keeps them looking and functioning well.

Can I repair a foggy double-pane window myself?

While defogging sets are sold online, they are generally a short-term cosmetic repair. They involve drilling tiny holes to dry the interior and applying a special vent, but they do not bring back the lost thermal insulation. To truly repair an unsuccessful seal, the whole insulated glass unit (IGU) should be replaced.



Should I repair or replace my windows?
