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A healthy septic system is a peaceful partner. When it works, you hardly think of it. When it stops working, you think of little else. A backup on a vacation weekend, a soggy spot over the drain field, a whiff of sulfur near the tank lid, these issues bring real costs and a reasonable quantity of stress. Second, schedule in the off season. Spring and early summertime are busy, and so are late fall weekends before holidays. If you can be versatile, midweek consultations in quieter months sometimes feature much better rates.

What you put matters. Cooking grease and oils harden and contribute to the scum layer. Bleach and severe cleaners in small, intermittent amounts are most likely great, but heavy, frequent usage can slow bacterial action. Antibacterial soaps, paint thinners, solvents, and medications do not belong in the system.

The waste disposal unit should have a frank appearance. It is convenient, however it grinds food that germs are sluggish to digest.
