

If you've recently signed up for ChatGPT Plus through OpenAI and want to avoid any surprise charges on your credit card, it's crucial to understand how the subscription process and trials work. Many new users mix up the **ChatGPT free plan** with a *free trial* of ChatGPT Plus, leading to confusion and unexpected charges.

One common mistake is calling the free plan a "trial" — don't do this! You can keep using the free plan indefinitely without entering any payment details.

What to do next:

Before signing up for ChatGPT Plus, double-check if you're actually enrolling in a free trial or just starting a paid subscription. Recognize that the free plan itself does not require a card or renewal.

Free Trials Are Targeted, Not Standard

Unlike many subscription services, OpenAI does not offer a standard one-month free trial for ChatGPT Plus. If you see any trial offers, these are:

- Specific to targeted campaigns
- Available through invites or promotional eligibility programs
- Variable in length — some trials last 7 days, others up to a month

Because these trials are not universally available, not everyone will see a “free trial” option when signing up for ChatGPT Plus.

Important note:

Trials under these programs can require a credit card upfront, and if you don’t cancel before it ends, the subscription can auto-renew at the \$20/mo rate plus applicable taxes.

What to do next:

If you got an invite or promotion for a ChatGPT Plus free trial, check carefully when the trial expires and set a calendar reminder to cancel if you don’t want to be charged.

How to Cancel a ChatGPT Subscription to Avoid Renewal Charges

If you’ve subscribed to ChatGPT Plus and want to **cancel the subscription to avoid future charges**, follow these steps. Remember, cancellation prevents the next billing cycle, so plan [why chatgpt not available country](#) accordingly.

Step-by-step cancellation guide (Web version):

1. Go to your account at **chat.openai.com** and log in.
2. Navigate to the top-right corner, click your profile icon to open the dropdown menu.
3. Select **Settings > Subscription**.
4. On the Subscription page, look for current ChatGPT Plus subscription details.
5. Click **Manage subscription**. This will open the billing portal.
6. Click **Cancel Plan** and follow the prompts to confirm cancellation.
