

Many travellers assume that getting a lift to the airport—whether from a friend, family member, or taxi—is a free and convenient option. After all, unlike paid parking or airport taxis, you don't see an immediate charge at the barrier or the parking lot, so how much can it really cost?

However, a growing number of UK airports have quietly introduced or increased **drop off and collection fees**, meaning that your “free lift” might not be so free after all. In this post, we'll break down these costs, compare them to alternative travel options, and help you weigh up whether a lift really saves money or just shifts the expense under the radar.

Drop Off and Collection Fees Are Rising Quietly Across UK Airports

Since 2024, the introduction or increase of **airport drop-off charges** has steadily grown across many UK airports. These charges aim to reduce congestion by encouraging travellers to use official parking or public transport instead of long dealership kerbside waiting.

As [airport parking vs taxi cost](#) of mid-2024, the **average drop-off charge stands at around £6.51** per vehicle trip. This isn't a trivial amount when you factor in that a return trip includes both dropping off and picking up, essentially doubling the cost to approximately £13 on average.

How Drop-off and Collection Charges Work

- **Drop-off charge:** This is the fee levied on vehicles when they pull into the short-stay or “kiss and fly” zone to drop passengers off at the terminal.
- **Collection charge:** When you come back to pick up arriving passengers, the same fee usually applies. Some airports count this as a separate visit.
- **Duration:** Most airport drop-off zones allow a short free period (e.g., 10-15 minutes) before charges start applying.

In practice, if your lift driver stays longer than the free period or simply returns to collect you later, these costs stack up quickly.

Which Airports Are the Most Expensive?

Airport Drop-off Charge (per visit) Notes
London Heathrow (LHR) £6.50 High traffic, strict short-stay enforcement
Manchester (MAN) £4.00 Charges apply after 10 minutes
Edinburgh (EDI) £5.00 £3 for first 10 minutes; £5 after
Bristol (BRS) £4.00 Drop-offs limited to 10 minutes free
Glasgow (GLA) £3.00 Relatively low drop off fee

Expenses vary but even moderate fees like £3-£5 per visit add up once you complete the loop of both drop off and pick up.

Is a “Free” Lift Actually Cost Effective?

To understand the real cost of a “free” lift, think about what a round trip to the airport entails:



1. Drop off at the airport terminal (costing around £6.51 on average).
2. Returning home after drop off, which may involve fuel, time, and vehicle wear and tear (this is often overlooked).
3. Return trip to collect arriving passengers, incurring another £6.51 charge.
4. Finally, the journey home again after pick up.

When combined, these expenses can easily top £20-30 or more when you factor in fuel, congestion, and parking fees — far from the “free” option most assume.

Example Calculation: Two Round Trips at an Average Airport

Expense Cost (£)	Notes	Drop-off charge (outbound)	£6.51	Average UK fee	Fuel and wear for drop off return	£4.00
Approximate estimate	Pick-up charge (inbound)	£6.51	Same as drop off	Fuel and wear for pick up return	£4.00	
Approximate estimate	Total Cost	£21.02	All combined for two round trips			

As the table shows, just using the airport's drop-off/pick-up zone is significantly pricier than many realise.

Free Alternatives: Long Stay, Park & Ride, and Public Transport

Thankfully, all is not lost if you want to avoid these rising kerbside charges. Several alternatives let you keep costs low—though they come with a trade-off in time and convenience.

1. Long Stay Parking

Most airports offer long stay car parks that are cheaper per day than short-stay or drop-off zones. You can park your car for the entire duration of your trip and take a shuttle bus to the terminal.

Pros:

- Lower daily cost per hour
- Generally no drop-off fees

Cons:

- Shuttles take time (usually 10-15 minutes) to and from the terminal

- Less convenient than being dropped at the exact terminal door

2. Park & Ride Services

Many airports also have Park & Ride sites located off-site, operated by private companies or councils, often with dedicated shuttle buses.



Pros:

- Lower cost than airport short-stay or on-site parking
- Park away from busy terminal areas

Cons:

- Requires additional shuttle transfer
- May involve longer journey times

3. Public Transport

For those travelling light, taking the train, coach, or bus to the airport eliminates vehicle fees and parking issues entirely.

Pros:

- Cost-effective and environmentally friendly
- Generally no parking charges

Cons:

- Limited luggage space
- Fixed schedules may require early arrivals
