3. Eliminate the middle screw on the jamb side of the top hinge.
4. Change the short screw with a 3-inch wood screw. As you drive it in, it will anchor into the tough wall stud behind the door frame, pulling the top of the door back into alignment.

Getting rid of Drafts

1. Inspect the door boundary while closed on a bright day to see where light shines through.
2. Eliminate old, brittle weatherstripping from the door jamb.
3. Clean the surface thoroughly.
4. Measure and cut new V-strip, foam tape, or rubber gasket weatherstripping to fit the leading and sides of the frame.
5. Press or nail the new product securely into place.
