The Mathematics Behind the Drop Rates

Rarity Tier	Approximate Drop Rate	Description
Consumer Grade (White)	N/A	Base weapons, rarely found in standard cases.
Industrial Grade (Light Blue)	79.92%	The most common drop; frequently referred to as "blues."
Mil-Spec (Dark Blue)	15.98%	Common drops, slightly higher value than blues.
Restricted (Purple)	3.20%	Uncommon items, typically the economical favorites.
Categorized (Pink)	0.64%	Rare products; typically high-tier weapon finishes.
Covert (Red)	0.16%	Extremely uncommon; flagship weapon skins for the case.
Unique Item (Gold)	0.26%	The prize tier, consisting of knives or gloves.

Keep in mind: There is approximately a 10% opportunity for any dropped item to include the StatTrak™ innovation, which cuts the base odds of that particular product in half again.

Float Values and Wear Conditions

Landing a rare red or gold skin is only half the fight. As soon as an item is won, its visual quality is figured out by its **Float Value**-- a number in between 0.00 and 1.00 that dictates wear and tear.

Gamers need to acquaint themselves with the five official wear classifications:



1. **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Pristine, very little scratches)
2. **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Slight imperfections or endure edges)
3. **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable scratches and dullness)
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear and texture loss)
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Extremely used, sometimes considerably modifying the skin's appearance)

Some skins in fact look better or maintain their value well in Field-Tested condition, while others drop in price if they aren't Factory New.

The Economics: Opening Cases vs. Buying Singles

From a simply monetary viewpoint, opening CS2 cases is generally a losing proposition. Due to the fact that the anticipated value (EV) of a case is lower than the combined cost of the case and the secret, the house (Valve) constantly wins in the long run.

To put this into viewpoint, consider the following contrast:

- **The Case Opening Route:**
 - **Pros:** The excitement of the gamble, the minuscule chance of hitting a high-tier knife, and the enjoyable of unboxing a self-mined product.
 - **Cons:** High financial threat, statistically guaranteed long-term losses, and the high likelihood of receiving low-tier "blue" products worth cents.
- **The Steam Marketplace/ Third-Party Trading Route:**
 - **Pros:** Complete control over purchases, guaranteed acquisition of desired skins, and no threat of losing money to RNG (Random Number Generation).

Tips for Responsible CS2 Case Opening
