Lighting matters just as much as the mirror itself. *Task lighting*, generally provided by sconces flanking the mirror at about eye level (66" to 70"), creates a shadow-free face illumination ideal for grooming. *Ambient lighting*—overhead or integrated into LED mirrors—provides overall room brightness but can't replace the precision of task lighting.

National Kitchen & Bath Association standards recommend:

1. Mount sconces on either side of the mirror about 28-36" apart depending on vanity width.
2. Avoid sconces too close to the mirror edges, which can cause glare on the glass.
3. If using a frameless mirror, allow at least 3-4" clearance per side for sconces.

Golden Lighting's popular bathroom sconces often require a minimum clearance to prevent reflections or glare from metal or glass shades onto the mirror surface, a crucial factor when sizing your mirror.

Electricians often note that hardwired mirrors with integrated lighting demand additional circuits and precise height placement to align with sconces and ceiling fixtures—this adds cost and complexity. So anticipate if you want to combine frameless mirrors with LED backlit options.

Behind every bathroom mirror is a team making precise adjustments that matter more than you might think:

- **Glaziers** take templates of your wall, vanity width, and lighting layout to cut custom plate glass with polished or beveled edges. This precision keeps frameless mirrors from feeling cheap or dangerous. Their labor can account for \$100–\$140 of your total cost.
