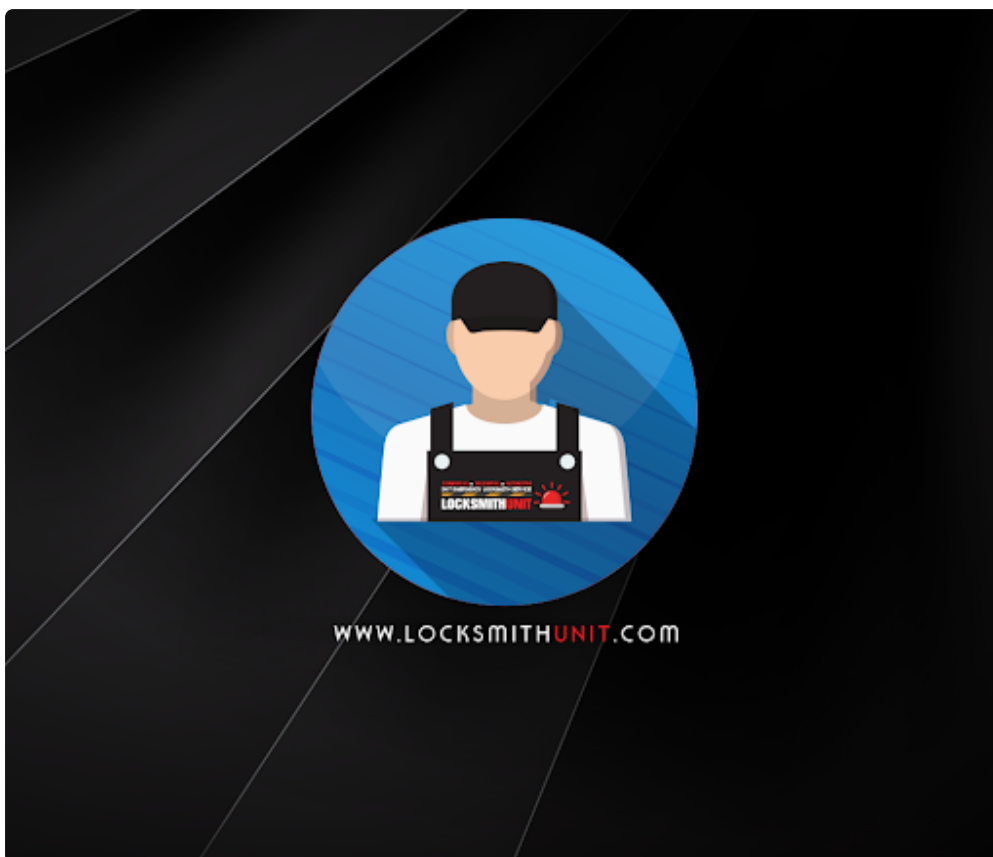
What to expect from programming-based key service
