The Trade-Up Contract System

If you have built up dozens of low-tier blue and purple skins from opening cases, CS2 provides an alternative system: **The Trade-Up Contract**.



Gamers can trade 10 weapon skins of the specific very same rarity tier for one weapon skin of the instant next higher rarity tier, chosen randomly from one of the collections represented in the traded items.

Best Practices for Trade-Ups:

- **Check Float Values:** The wear condition (float) of the resulting skin is computed mathematically based upon the average floats of the ten input skins.
- **Control the Pool:** Try to use inputs from the exact same collection to guarantee the output skin you prefer, rather than mixing collections and leaving your outcome to pure possibility.

Tips and Best Practices for CS2 Openings
