1. Fixing a Squeaky or Loose Hinge

A squeaky door is a simple repair, but a loose hinge requires a bit more attention.

1. **Inspect the hinges:** Tighten all screws on the top and middle hinges.

3. **Aircraft the edge:** If the door still sticks after adjusting the hinges, use a block plane or a sander to shave down a small fraction of wood from the sticking edge, then repaint or seal the exposed wood.
