As shown above, the home or the RNG (Random Number Generator) dictates when a crash occurs. A round can crash immediately at 1.00 x, ruining anybody who did not react in milliseconds.

Why Do Players Risk Their Skins?

The skin economy runs in a different way than fiat currency. To many players, a digital knife worth £ 300 feels less tangible than a £ 300 bill in their physical wallet.
