Since it hasn't remained in active rotation for almost a decade, its cost has actually climbed up into the hundreds of dollars [cs2 cases](#) per system.

3. CS: GO Weapon Case 2 and 3

Following the huge success of the original weapon case, Valve released follows up containing cult-classic skins like the Five-SeveN|Case Hardened (Case 2) and different dual-berettas and CZ75-As (Case 3). While a little cheaper than Series # 1, they stay heavy hitters in the collector community.
