

If silverfish are showing up in your house, the best starting point is simple: lower humidity, clean up food sources, and eliminate hiding places. Insecticide sprays may kill silverfish on contact and can help around cracks, baseboards, or entry areas. However, sprays alone rarely solve a recurring problem if moisture and clutter remain. They are best used as part of integrated pest management rather than as a stand-alone fix.

Home remedies can cut down the population, but if humidity, leaks, and storage issues are not addressed, silverfish often return.



For homeowners trying to decide where to start, sticky traps and moisture reduction are often the easiest first steps. Then add targeted dusts or sprays only where needed.
