- **The Fix:** Unfortunately, defogging sets are generally a short-lived cosmetic repair. The most effective option is to change the insulated glass unit (IGU) while keeping the existing window frame intact.

3. Stuck Windows

Painted-shut windows or windows jammed by dirt and inflamed wood frames can be discouraging.

- **The Fix:** For painted windows, thoroughly run an energy knife along the paint seal. For wood windows inflamed by humidity, prevent requiring them; instead, use a silicone-based lubricant or wait for drier weather condition before planning to plane down the edges.

Typical Door Issues and How to Address Them

Doors take a whipping from continuous opening, closing, slamming, and moving foundations.

1. Sticking or Sagging Doors

A door that drags out the flooring or refuses to latch properly typically has loose hinges or has shifted in addition to the home's foundation.

- **The Fix:** Open the door and inspect the hinge screws. Tighten any loose screws. If the door still droops, replacing one or more brief hinge screws with longer 3-inch screws that bite deep into the framing stud can pull the door back into positioning.

2. Harmed Door Jambs and Thresholds

- **The Fix:** For small rot, scrape away the decayed wood, treat it with wood hardener, and fill the space with outside wood filler. For severe rot, cutting out the damaged area and splicing in a new piece of rot-resistant wood (or changing the jamb entirely) is required.
