- Will you be able to finish this in one go to with the truck and team you're sending?

If a company answers these quickly and plainly, you're most likely dealing with pros. If they dodge, stall, or make complex easy questions, move on.

Getting your area all set: Prep that saves time and money

Preparation does not mean gruelling labor. It indicates removing friction, literally and figuratively. Clear sidewalks from the curb or driveway to the items. If possible, place smaller items in boxes or bags to speed loading. Recognize products you want to keep with tape or sticky notes to avoid accidental removal.
