- **Verify Game Files:** Right-click the video game in Steam > > Properties > Installed Files > > *Verify integrity of game files*.
- **Update Everything:** Ensure Windows, your graphics card software application, and Steam are all running the most recent steady versions.
- **Examine Temperatures:** Use keeping an eye on software (like MSI Afterburner) to guarantee overheating elements aren't activating safety shutdowns.
