



A safe home is not just clean and comfortable. It is also protected from the quiet damage, contamination, and stress that pests can bring indoors. Most infestations do not begin with a dramatic event. They start with a few ants near a baseboard, a scratching sound in the attic, a line of droppings behind the water heater, or a wasp nest tucked under the eaves. They notice mud tubes along a foundation wall, blistering paint, hollow-sounding trim, damaged baseboards, or swarmers near windows during certain times of year.
