Both allergens can embed themselves deep into household dust, where they linger long after the cockroaches are gone. This dust is not just on your countertops—it's found hidden under appliances, in cracks and crevices, and in furniture. When this allergen-laden dust becomes airborne, it can trigger allergic reactions and asthma attacks, especially in sensitive individuals.

What Are Settled Dust Allergen Test Kits?

Settled dust allergen test kits are commercially available tools designed to collect dust samples from your home to analyze for specific allergens, including cockroach proteins like Bla g and Per a. Usually, you use a vacuum

attachment or swabs to gather dust from selected areas of your home, then send the samples to a lab for analysis.

They don't reach cockroach hiding spots well and do nothing about allergen dust in cracks and under appliances. Instead, foggers can disperse insecticides into the airflow, causing irritations and no lasting relief.

HEPA Filter Vacuuming and Wet-Wiping: Your Best Allies

A tried-and-true method to control cockroach allergens goes beyond pest control products. Use these steps for effective dust and allergen management:

1. **Pull out the fridge and other appliances.** This is non-negotiable. Allergens gather in the forgotten spaces behind and underneath.
2. **Vacuum with a HEPA filter vacuum.** HEPA filters trap tiny allergen particles and prevent putting them back into the air.
3. **Wet wipe surfaces instead of dry dusting.** Dry dusting just moves allergens around, while wet wipe cloths capture and remove them.
4. **Seal cracks and crevices.** Use caulk or sealant to reduce cockroach harboring spots.
5. **Fix moisture problems.** Cockroaches love humid spots, so repair leaks and use dehumidifiers where needed.

This approach not only reduces visible dust but targets the source of cockroach allergens. *Remember, allergen dust doesn't just coat surfaces you see—it's in the hidden nooks, too*, so a true cleaning effort is comprehensive.
