- **Jackpot:** Multiple gamers throw skins into a common pot. A lottery-style wheel spins, and the total worth of the pot is granted to a single winner, with higher-value items increasing a player's relative share of the wheel.
- **Upgrader:** A risk-based video game where a gamer picks a skin they want to win (worth more than their existing skin) and rolls a wheel to see if they effectively upgrade.

Comparing CS2 Gambling Game Types

How Deposits and Withdrawals Work
