 - *Pros:* Can yield short-term gains if the player has an infinite bankroll.
 - *Cons:* Highly hazardous. Striking a string of consecutive early crashes (e.g., five 1.00 x crashes in a row) will quickly exhaust even a large bankroll or strike maximum bet limits set by the platform.
 - **The Moonshot (High Multiplier Chase)**
 - *How it works:* Placing small bets and holding out for massive multipliers (50x, 100x, or more).
 - *Pros:* Extremely high payouts for a really small initial threat.
 - *Cons:* Statistically unusual occasions; the probability of losing the stake is exceptionally high.
