Valve's Stance and Legal Crackdowns

- **API Restrictions:** Valve carried out trade hold restrictions, suggesting traded items can not be traded once again for seven days. This considerably decreased the automated depositing and withdrawing systems utilized by gambling sites.
- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has actually often targeted prominent gambling operators with legal warnings, requiring lots of prominent sites to close down or modify their service designs.
- **Account Bans:** Valve regularly prohibits trade bots and personal accounts related to business gambling operations.

In spite of these efforts, the industry adapts. Sites have actually moved toward accepting cryptocurrencies (Bitcoin, Ethereum, GBPT) or alternative payment processors along with-- or entirely in place of-- direct skin trading, permitting them to prevent Steam's restrictions.
