- **StatTrak™**: Items with this technology include an orange LED counter that tracks the variety of verified kills made with that particular weapon.
- **Memento Packages**: These are dropped throughout main Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors) and feature gold sticker labels representing the teams and MVP of the round.

The Rarity Tiers

Valve organizes CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which determine how frequently they drop in-game or emerge from weapon cases.

1. **Customer Grade (White):** Common, standard drops.
2. **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly better than Consumer, common in containers.
3. **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard lower-tier case drops.
4. **Restricted (Purple):** Often forms the base active ingredients for trade-ups.
5. **Categorized (Pink):** Highly detailed, desirable mid-tier skins.
6. **Covert (Red):** The greatest standard rarity found in cases, including the most complex styles.
