- **Coinflip:** A direct player-versus-player (PvP) video game mode where 2 users wager equivalent quantities of skins or credits. A virtual coin is turned, and the winner takes the whole pot.

- **Jackpot:** Multiple players pool their skins into a single pot. The greater the worth of the skins a user contributes, the greater their percentage chance of winning the whole accumulated pot.

Safety, Legality, and Risks
