The Anatomy of a Finish: What Determines Value?

1. Outside Wear (Float Value)

Every item drops with a specific "float value" ranging from **0.00 to 1.00**, which determines its physical wear and tear. The float is divided into 5 main wear categories:

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Pristine, very little scratches)
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Slight imperfections, normally near edges)
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable wear, scratches, or fading)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear, paint cracking)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Extremely worn, often significantly altering the texture)

Note: Some products look fantastic even in Battle-Scarred condition, while others are valued strictly in Factory New.

2. Product Rarity Tiers

Valve classifies weapon finishes into color-coded tiers based on their drop rates in cases or trade-ups.

Beyond float values and rarities, two major features can dramatically pump up a product's worth: **Pattern Indexes** and **StatTrak™ technology**.

Pattern Templates

Numerous surfaces use a procedural generation system where a texture design template moves throughout the weapon design based on a "Paint Seed" (from 1 to 1000). Depending upon the seed number, the visual look can alter entirely.

- **Case Hardened:** Famous for its blue and gold circulations. A pattern with a high percentage of strong blue on top can command 10s of countless dollars.
- **Fade:** Depending on the seed, the shift from yellow to pink to purple can differ, with "100% Fade" versions fetching top dollar.

StatTrak™ Technology

Items equipped with StatTrak™ feature a small digital LCD screen connected to the weapon body that tracks the number of verified kills the owner makes with it. While these items drop at the exact same rate as their non-StatTrak counterparts, they normally command a greater rate tag on the Steam Community Market and third-party trading sites.
