Once a skin leaves the main store, its fate is handed over to the player-driven Steam Community Market and third-party trading sites, where supply and demand determine its cost.

The *Rust* skin economy is often compared to a mini stock exchange. Countless dollars alter hands yearly, and unusual items can appreciate in worth drastically with time.

Several elements affect the price of a *Rust* skin:

- **Supply and Demand:** Skins released years earlier during a time when the player base was much smaller naturally have a lower supply, driving up costs.

- **Banner and Creator Endorsements:** Skins produced in cooperation with popular content developers frequently see huge spikes in appeal and cost.
