- **Trade Lock Implementations:** To combat instant skin trading on gambling websites, Valve presented a **7-day trade hold**. If a player receives a skin in a trade, they can not trade it again for a complete week. This significantly disrupted the automated, high-frequency trading bots used by CSGO gambling establishments.
- **Account Bans:** Valve routinely bans accounts associated with commercial gambling, leading to countless dollars worth of skins being locked completely inside prohibited stocks.

In spite of these measures, the industry has shown extremely resistant, continuously developing new workarounds to bypass Valve's restrictions.
