Valve's Stance and Crackdowns

Valve, the designer of Counter-Strike 2, has actually historically taken a cautious and reactive approach to gambling.

- In 2016, Valve issued cease-and-desist letters to dozens of major skin-gambling websites, forcing lots of to close down momentarily.

- Over the years, Valve has implemented trade lock periods (preventing newly traded skins from being traded again for seven days) to suppress automatic bot trading used by gambling sites.
- In spite of these steps, operators continuously discover technical workarounds, such as utilizing peer-to-peer (P2P) trading systems or shifting deals entirely to cryptocurrency.

Best Practices for Navigating the Ecosystem
