Example Cost Structure

To show the economics of a typical 10-person battle, think about a lobby that uses the "Gamma 2" case (\approx £ 2.30 per case). Each individual purchases one case, so the overall pot is £ 23.00. The platform takes a 5% commission (£ 1.15), leaving £ 21.85 to be dispersed as follows:

Top 5 Tips for Beginners

- Start Small**-- Choose low-cost cases (e.g., CS: GO Weapon Case, Operation Bravo) to acquaint yourself with the circulation without risking large bankrolls.
