1. **Development:** Community artists design skins using 3D modeling software and publish them to the Steam Workshop.
2. **Community Voting:** Players vote on their favorite designs, pressing popular items to the attention of developers.
3. **Selection:** Facepunch curates a weekly batch of accepted skins.
4. **The Item Store:** Every Thursday, a brand-new batch of skins is launched on the official Rust Item Store for a repaired, low rate (usually ranging from £ 0.99 to £ 3.00).

Once bought from the official shop, these items have a one-week trade and market constraint. After that week, they go into the Steam Community Market, where supply and demand determine their true worth.

The Rust Skin Economy: Supply and Demand

The Rust skin market operates similar to a real-world stock exchange. Rates vary based on rarity, energy, and general gamer demand.

Aspects That Influence Skin Prices:

Raiding or navigating a base during a pitch-black Rust night can be disorienting. Skins with glowing components-- such as heaters, storage boxes, and door frames-- enable gamers to navigate their bases without turning on lights that reveal their position to outsiders.
