- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has legally forced popular platform operators to shut down their operations or pivot far from utilizing Steam-related infrastructure.

Regardless of these measures, operators continue to adjust by using peer-to-peer markets, alternative cryptocurrencies, and overseas licensing to keep their platforms running.
