



If you've recently completed a renovation or moved into a newly built home, your HVAC system is likely harboring more than just fresh air. Post construction introduces fine particulates, drywall dust, and construction debris into supply and return lines that can circulate for months. Post construction duct cleaning is a high-impact way to quickly reduce allergens, protect your HVAC equipment, and restore indoor air quality before you settle in.

Why construction affects air ducts so much Renovation work releases enormous volumes of ultrafine particles—think drywall dust, sawdust, mineral fibers, and silica. Even with protective barriers, negative air machines, and daily cleanups, these contaminants drift. - **Fewer allergy triggers:** Lower airborne particulates means fewer sneezes and less irritation for sensitive occupants. This is especially valuable for move-in duct cleaning right before families or pets occupy the space.
- **Cleaner home faster:** Dust resettling diminishes dramatically. You'll spend less time wiping film from surfaces after a remodel.
- **Better HVAC performance:** Clean coils and blowers improve airflow and heat exchange, helping your system reach setpoints faster with less energy.

Timing: when to schedule contractor duct cleaning

- **If temporary heat or AC ran during construction:** Many builders operate the system for climate control. If so, schedule cleaning as a near-final step.
- **Before installing new filters:** Replace filters after the cleaning—don't clog new media capturing the last of the construction load.

How to choose the right provider

- Require source removal methods: HEPA negative air machines and mechanical agitation are the backbone of effective drywall dust duct cleaning.

What you can do before the crew arrives

- Replace or remove return grills and supply registers for better access.
- Cover furnishings and move small items from under registers.
- Turn off the HVAC and identify all thermostat locations.
- Note any rooms with heavy cutting or sanding; these branches may need extra attention.
- Share any concerns about odors, moisture, or visible mold so the team can plan appropriately.

Don't overlook adjacent components Construction dust doesn't stop at sheet metal. Effective renovation air duct cleaning often includes:

- Air handler and cabinet interiors: Dust on blower blades unbalances the wheel and reduces airflow.
- Heat exchangers and evaporator coils: A fine layer of dust acts like insulation, hurting efficiency.
- Return cavities in wall or floor cavities: These "panned" returns can trap jobsite debris.
- Dryer vents if on site: Although separate from HVAC, they collect drywall lint and can become a fire hazard post-renovation.

Filter strategy after cleaning

- Start with a new, quality filter: MERV 8–11 suits most homes without stressing residential blowers. If allergies are severe, consider MERV 13 if your system can handle the pressure drop.
- Monitor closely for the first month: Construction residue can continue to dislodge; check filters at two and four weeks.
- Establish a schedule: After move-in duct cleaning, keep a 60–90 day filter replacement cadence, adjusting for pets and occupancy.

DIY versus professional service Light vacuuming of registers, wiping grills, and swapping filters helps.
