1. The Wild West Era (2013-- 2019)

In the early years, secrets were completely liquid. 2. The Anti-Fraud Update (October 2019)

Valve enacted a sweeping update: **Newly purchased secrets might no longer be traded or offered on the Community Market.**

This single update ruined secrets as a peer-to-peer currency overnight, causing massive market panic and moving the trading community toward alternative currencies like Arcanas (from Dota 2) and skin-based trading.

Understanding Case Unboxing Odds

Before acquiring a crucial and a case, players need to understand the mathematical truth of unboxing. Valve transparently releases the drop rates for products in cases, which usually align with the following probabilities:

Item Rarity Approximate Drop Rate Example **Mil-Spec (Blue)** ~ 79.92% Standard, common weapon surfaces
Limited (Purple) ~ 15.98% Uncommon, somewhat more detailed skins **Classified (Pink)** ~ 3.20% Rare,
extremely in-demand weapon skins **Covert (Red)** ~ 0.64% Extremely uncommon, flagship gun skins **Unique Item (Gold)** ~ 0.26% Knives and Gloves (The "Jackpot")

*Note: There is also approximately a 10% chance that any dropped product will feature **StatTrak**™ technology, which tracks the number of kills made with that weapon.*

How to Acquire CS2 Case Keys

For gamers seeking to dive into unboxing, there are two primary methods to acquire keys, each with unique benefits and drawbacks.



- **In-Game Store (Direct Purchase)**
 - *Cost:* ~ £ 2.50 GBP (differs a little by local currency).
 - *Pros:* Always available, straight from Valve, entirely safe.
 - *Cons:* Non-tradable and non-marketable.
- **Steam Community Market (Older/Specific Keys)**
 - *Cost:* Varies based upon supply and need.
 - *Pros:* Access to tradition operation secrets (if any are still marketable).
 - *Cons:* Often priced higher than £ 2.50 due to collector value.

Are Case Keys a Good Investment?

While the days of using secrets as a universal currency are long gone, they remain a staple of the Counter-Strike experience in CS2.
