

Mt. Sinai has a way of rewarding people who slow down a little. It is not the kind of place that tries to impress you with noise or spectacle. The appeal is subtler than that. You notice it in the salt air near the harbor, in the quiet streets lined with mature trees, in the small local businesses that survive because neighbors actually use them, and in the way homes and commercial properties here have to stand up to wind, humidity, winter salt, pollen, and the everyday grime that comes with living close to the water.
