3. **Selection:** Facepunch curates a weekly batch of accepted skins.
4. **The Item Store:** Every Thursday, a brand-new batch of skins is launched on the main Rust Item Store for a repaired, low rate (typically ranging from £ 0.99 to £ 3.00).

Once bought from the official shop, these items have a one-week trade and market limitation. After that week, they get in the Steam Community Market, where supply and demand dictate their true value.
