

Burlington, Massachusetts, sits in that useful middle ground between small-town character and practical suburban convenience. It is close enough to Boston to feel connected to the wider region, yet it still carries its own identity, shaped by older colonial routes, postwar growth, and the steady rhythm of a community that has learned how to balance commerce, history, and daily life. The opener may still run, but the system is telling you that something is out of alignment.

That is why routine attention is worth more than many people think. A visual inspection from inside the garage can catch issues early. Look for frayed cables, gaps in the spring, cracked rollers, and uneven movement. Listen for new noises. Compare one side of the door to the other. If a door has always opened in a smooth, level motion and suddenly starts dragging or pausing, that is not just age. It is a symptom.
